

A Mercedes-Benz TV commercial shows one of their cars colliding with a concrete wall during a safety test. Someone then asks a Mercedes engineer why their company does not enforce their patent on their car's energy-absorbing car body. The Mercedes' design has been copied by almost every other car maker in the world in spite of the fact that they have an exclusive patent. The engineer replies in a clipped German accent, "Because in life, some things are just too important not to share."

Wow! What a great statement. Some things are just too important not to share. On Sunday, April 20, as we gather for worship we will hear these words of the Gospel, "The angel spoke to the women. 'I know you are looking for Jesus who was nailed to the cross. He is not here; He has risen, just as he said. Come here and see the place where he lay. Quickly, now, go and tell his disciples: He has been raised from death, and now he is going to Galilee ahead of you; there you will see him! Remember what I have told you. So they left the grave in a hurry, afraid and yet filled with joy, and ran to tell his disciples."

As Christians we believe that the Good News of Jesus (who having died for our sins, buried in the tomb and risen from the grave) is too important not to share. In this season of Easter we are given the assurance that our life does not just end with our death. We have the assurance that we have a future after our death. One of the priorities of the present council is to keep the members of The Lutheran Church of Mahomet more easily and better informed of actions taken and matters discussed at council meetings in a more timely manner. Minutes from the February 10, 2014, meeting have been approved and posted.

At the March 10, 2014, meeting, the following motion was made and passed: To designate the Lenten services offering to the LCM Pastor Emergency Fund.

Other matters discussed or decided at the March 10, 2014, meeting were as follows:

- 1. How to make all programs in the church more intergenerational so that youth would be included in the programs of the church
- 2. Finding out what it would cost to repair the lit sign and relocate it to the front of the church
- 3. Designating the web calendar as the official calendar of all events and activities and the office paper calendar for staff vacations, days off, and things of that nature
- 4. Obtaining new directional signs to LCM



Adult Sunday School Schedule for Men and Women:



God Speaks Charles Peguy, (Pegie) French , 1873-1914,

translated by Ann and Julian Green Jesus teaches that his disciples should not be anxious and he embodies calm trust as he sleeps in the boat and wakes to still both the storm and the disciples' fear. Here Peguy writes of sleep as beatitude.

I don't like the man who doesn't sleep, says God. Sleep is the friend of man. Sleep is the friend of God. Sleep is perhaps the most beautiful thing I have created.

And I myself rested on the seventh day.

- He whose heart is pure, sleeps. And he who sleeps has a pure heart.
- That is the great secret of being as indefatigable as a child.
- Of having that strength in the legs that a child has. Those new legs, those new souls,
- And to begin afresh every morning, ever new,

Like young hope, new hope . . .

He who doesn't sleep is unfaithful to Hope.

And it is the great infidelity.

Because it is infidelity to the greatest Faith.

- Poor children, they conduct their business with wisdom during the day.
- But when evening comes, they can't make up their minds,
- They can't be resigned to trust my wisdom for the space of one night
- With the conduct and the governing of their business.
- As if I wasn't capable, if you please, of looking after it a little.
 - Of watching over it.
 - Of governing and conducting, and all that kind of stuff
- I have a great deal more business to look after, poor people,

I govern creation, maybe that is more difficult.

You might perhaps, and no harm done, leave your business in my hands, O wise men.

Maybe I am just as wise as you are.

You might perhaps leave it for me for the space of a night.

While you are asleep

At last

- And the next morning you might find it not too badly damaged perhaps ...
- Put off until tomorrow those tears which fill your eyes and your head,

Flooding you, rolling down your cheeks, those tears which stream down your cheeks.

- Because between now and tomorrow, maybe I, God, will have passed by your way.
- Human wisdom says: Woe to the man who puts off what he has to do until tomorrow.
- And I say Blessed, blessed is the man who puts off what he has to do until tomorrow.
- Blessed is he who puts off. That is to say Blessed is be who hopes. Then sleeps.

EASTER LILIES

It is that time of year to celebrate the Easter season by brightening up our Sanctuary with Easter Lilies. There is a sign-up sheet located on the quad board in the Narthex. The cost is \$7.00 each. Please sign up by April 13th. Please make the check out to LCM and write "Easter Lily" on the memo line. Thank you in advance for your support.

At home, keep your lily away from drafts and drying heat sources such as appliances or heating ducts. Bright, indirect light is best with daytime temperatures of 65 to 75° F. Water the plant only when the soil feels dry to the touch, but do not overwater. To prolong the life of the blossoms, remove the yellow anthers (pollen-bearing pods) found in the center of each flower.

Do not throw away your Easter lily after it is done blooming. You can save the bulb and plant it outdoors. Easter lilies can be replanted outside after the blooms are gone. Plant the Easter lily outdoors as soon as the ground can be worked. Select a sunny site with well-drained soil. Set the top of the bulb six-inches below the soil surface. Cut off the old flowers, but leave the stem and leaves. Do not cut back the stem until it dies down in the fall, then cut it off at the soil surface. After the soil surface freezes in late fall, mulch the soil and do not remove the mulch until new growth begins in the spring.

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
