

#### The Season of Lent begins on Wednesday, March 5th

Lent is a period of forty days in which the Sundays are not included. It begins on Ash Wednesday and runs through the Saturday before Easter. Many Christians are confused these days about how to observe Lent.

Our forefathers used to fast and deny themselves worldly pleasures during this season. Many of them gave up something for Lent. There were no weddings, parties, or other festivities during this time. Today, most of this has gone by the board.

We remember that Jesus says, "If any person would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me." To deny ourselves means not merely to deny ourselves something! One of the priorities of the present council is to keep the members of The Lutheran Church of Mahomet more easily and better informed of actions taken and matters discussed at council meetings in a more timely manner. For more detailed information as to the council meetings, you are welcome to take a copy of the minutes from the quad board after they are approved and posted. Minutes from the January 13, 2014, meeting have been approved and posted.

Matters discussed or decided at the February 10, 2014, meeting were as follows:

- 1. Repairs for the keypad entry, a leak in the kitchen ceiling, and a sewer line
- 2. To reconvene the annual meeting on March 2, 2014, to present the 2014 budget for approval
- 3. Need for a youth chairperson and some type of division of duties of the youth committee
- 4. Need for a VBS leader so that planning can begin soon
- 5. Program ideas and possible speakers for the council retreat
- 6. Continuing to hold council meetings on the second Monday of each month
- 7. Delivering membership directories and the small group brochure to members who have not picked up their directories
- 8. Having a rental policy and procedure for calendaring of rentals of the church facilities
- 9. A request by Waldorf College asking us to host a concert on May 6 and provide dinner and host families for approximately 34 choir members to be considered by the music and worship committee

Members of the congregation are welcome to attend any council meeting. If a member wishes to present an issue to the council for consideration at a meeting, a request should be made to the president, the church council secretary, or the church office by the Thursday prior to the meeting so

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### 15 Minutes with God

Prayer is one of the foundational resources that we as Christians have to help ground us in our faith; however, due to a variety of circumstances, it becomes increasingly more difficult for people to find time to develop their prayer life. "15 Minutes With God" is designed to help people reclaim prayer as one of the foundational resources of their life.



**How it works**: You are invited to make a commitment to spend 15 minutes in prayer with God each day for a specific period of time (i.e. one week, one month, three months, six months, one year, etc.). During this pre-selected time period, you agree to "make every effort to the best of your ability" to pray 15 minutes each day. In addition, your congregation could help support this ministry by providing you with additional prayer resources.

### 7 Easy Steps

- 1. Determine the length of the time-frame (a week, a month, etc.) to which you will devote 15 minutes each day for prayer.
- 2. Set aside a specific time each day for "uninterrupted conversation" with God.
- 3. Find a "<u>quiet place</u>" where there will be no outside distractions.
- 4. Make yourself comfortable as if you were going to sit down and have a conversation with a familiar friend.
- 5. Speak aloud or from your heart and tell God what has been going on in your life.
- 6. If you are unsure of what to say, do any of the following:
  - PRAISE God for something wonderful that has happened;
  - ASK God for guidance and/or direction;
  - CONFESS something that has been troubling you;
  - THANK God for the blessings in your life;
  - PRAY for someone else;
  - LISTEN in silence and wait for God to speak to you;
  - READ the Bible and allow God to speak to you via the scriptures.
- 7. As you engage in this kind of prayer, share your experiences with others. Invite them to set aside 15 minutes each day for prayer.

### For Your Consideration

- What are the biggest factors in your life that help you to nurture and/or develop your prayer life?
- 2. Who are the people and what are the concerns in your daily life about which you pray?
- 3. What can your congregation do to help you develop a deeper prayer life?

#### When I Survey the Wondrous Cross

While preparing for a communion service in 1707, Isaac Watts wrote this deeply moving and very personal expression of gratitude for the amazing love that the death of Christ on the cross revealed. It first appeared in print that same year in Watts' outstanding collection, Hymns and Spiritual Songs. The hymn was originally titled, "Crucifixion to the World by the Cross of Christ." Noted theologian Matthew Arnold called this the greatest hymn in the English language. In Watts' day, texts such as this, which were based only on personal feelings, were termed "hymns of human composure" and were very controversial, since almost all congregational singing at this time consisted of ponderous repetitions of the Psalms. The unique thoughts presented by Watts in these lines certainly must have pointed the 18<sup>th</sup> century Christians to a view of the dying Savior in a vivid and memorable way that led them to a deeper worship experience, even as it does for us today.

Young Watts showed unusual talent at an early age, learning Latin when he was 5, Greek at 9, French at 11 and Hebrew at 12. As he grew up, he became increasingly disturbed by the uninspiring psalm singing in the English churches. He commented, "The singing of God's praise is the part of worship most closely related to heaven; but its performance among us is the worst on earth." Throughout his life, Isaac Watts wrote over 600 hymns and is known today as the "father of English hymnody." His hymns were strong and triumphant statements of the Christian faith, yet none ever equaled the colorful imagery and genuine devotion of this emotionally stirring and magnificent hymn text.
