

Train up a child in the way he should go and when he is old he will not depart from it (Proverbs 22:6)

Beginning in late August and continuing in September is a focus on education (both religious and secular). Students are back on campuses of Universities and Colleges. We have our 26 colleges and universities of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and 8 Seminaries scattered across the states from California to New York. These institutions are far more vital in the strength and mission of the church than most of us realize. Our young adults receive, not only a superb education in liberal arts and scripture but are also experiencing Christian growth as they participate in campus life and socialize. When they graduate and join a congregation where they begin their careers, they become confident witnesses and leaders in the local community of faith.

And so also our various pre-schools, elementary schools, High schools, colleges etc. are now in session following a summer recess. Sunday School resumes; confirmation classes begin; a new year for Logos is underway; Bible Studies; Adult Sunday Class; All God's Children (AGI) pre-school.....and more...are all part of the mission of Lutheran Church of Mahomet. We are thinking, "Education" ! But do we stop to realize that all of these places and institutions are "supplementary to" or "extensions of" the education received in the home? Yes, the concept of home schooling is not new. We have been doing it from the beginnings with the first family. Sons and daughters would work along side their parents and learn various skills. While doing that they would hear stories from the past. They would hear about dreams, visions and plans for the future. They would learn about Jesus and how to live life in harmony with God's divine Will. Dr. Martin Luther assembled the Small Catechism to be used by parents for teaching the Christian Faith in the home. The home is where education for children is expected to take place. Of course, adults (parents) keep learning themselves as they consciously or sub-consciously serve as teachers. We need God's guidance and wisdom to carry out our roles.

Cynthia, a Parochial pre-school teacher, spent several weeks during the past Summer as a nanny to three children under the age of five years. The mother was into body building and, when not working out, was competing in body building events in various cities far from home. The father had to spend his days in his career. The children's welfare was not a priority. The children had no social skills and thus were denied admission to pre-school. The three children clung to their nanny for love, attention and learning during the day time hours. When evening came, the children regressed to former behaviors in the presence of their parents. The consistency and atmosphere for growing and learning was not there. The next morning the nanny would have to start her work all over again. Training up a child has to do with molding them and shaping them so that they have a fear of God (a high respect and adoration for God) that will remain strong into old age.

Actually, we spend a life-time learning. Most careers or jobs today require continuing education, both off and on the job. We do well to strengthen our relationship with God with learning, socializing with our community of faith, and receiving regularly the means of Grace, God's Word and the Sacrament.

AUGUST COUNCIL NOTES Submitted by Sherri Reifsteck, Church Council Secretary

One of the priorities of the present council is to keep the members of The Lutheran Church of Mahomet more easily and better informed of actions taken and matters discussed at council meetings in a more timely manner. For more detailed information as to the council meetings, you are welcome to take a copy of the minutes from the guad board after they are approved and posted. Minutes from the July 19, 2013, meeting have been approved and posted.

At the August 19, 2013, meeting, the following motions were made and passed:

- 1. That we present for consideration to the congregation at the October congregational meeting set for October 20, 2013, the new cranberry hymnals with each family to be asked to purchase one hymnal
- 2. That the revised Ministry Site Profile be approved with two changes and revised dates

Other matters discussed or decided at the August 19 meeting were as follows:

- 1. Any funds for the kitchen project not covered by memorial funds will come from the equipment replacement fund.
- 2. The dishwasher has been ordered, and the plumbing and electrical work needed to be done before installation should be complete by August 25.
- 3. Many of the projects requested by the preschool, including certain repairs to the playground and painting of the classroom, were completed by the building and grounds committee. Some painting and plastic replacement of playground equipment still needs to be done.
- 4. Dates for special services and events were scheduled.
- 5. The parent/student meeting for confirmation is scheduled for August 28 with the first class session to be on September 11.
- 6. A nominating committee needs to be organized so that nominees can be made for available council positions.

Members of the congregation are welcome to attend any council meeting. The meetings are held at 7:00pm on the third Monday of every month. If a member wishes to present an issue to the council for consideration at a meeting, a request should be made to the president, the church council secretary, or the church office by the Thursday prior to the meeting so that the item can be placed on the agenda. The next council meeting is August 19, 2013, at 7:00pm.

Fall is a busy time! Activities are gearing up at school, sports, work, and at the Lutheran Church of Mahomet. As we leave the summer days behind and become immersed in our busier schedules, now is the time to sharpen our stewardship skills! No kidding! Stewardship is about how we care for everything that God has given to us. It's how we care for our families, our homes, our bodies and our environment. It's how we use our God-given talents and how we live as Christians in response to God's love. So, as we juggle our time, talents, and resources this fall, let's not overlook being good stewards!

In an ELCA stewardship resource, a new approach to stewardship is explained. I was particularly interested in this "shift" as it relates to our Christian stewardship in a broad sense. This new approach to stewardship requires a large shift in the way that we think and talk about stewardship: BEFORE NOW "Stewardship is about paying the bills "Stewardship is about loving God and my neighbor." "Stewardship is about money." "Stewardship is about my whole self." "How much of what is mine should I give away?" "How much of what is God's should I keep for myself?" "We don't have enough."

The new approach to stewardship is not primarily about paying the congregation's bills. Instead stewardship is about how the congregation together can do God's work. It is about how the congregation can together live out God's call to love God and our neighbors. Stewardship is directly tied to discipleship. It is no longer about the congregation's need to receive, but about the giver's need to give. Stewardship is a way of life. It is not just about what is given to the congregation, but how generous we are with all that God has entrusted to our care both inside and outside of the church walls and in our homes. Did You Know... that the worship hymnal we are currently using is 35 years old? In 2005, a new hymnal was published called Evangelical Lutheran Worship. The introduction in this new book of worship gives a great description on the Lutheran Church's philosophy in terms of the worshiping assembly, and it couldn't be more relevant for the Lutheran Church of Mahomet today. The Christian assembly worships in the midst of an ever-changing world. And because the worship that constitutes the church is also the fundamental expression of the mission of God in the world, worship is regularly renewed in order to be both responsible and responsive to the world that the church is called to serve. Materials are newly included to help congregations welcome adults and children to formation in faith, to baptism, and to the baptismal life. Additional settings of Holy Communion highlight both the increased diversity of expression in the church, as well as, the commitment to gathering regularly around both God's Word and the Holy Supper. Evangelical Lutheran Worship continues to emphasize that "freedom and flexibility in worship is a Lutheran inheritance, and there is room for ample variety in ceremony, music, and liturgical form. Through its design and variety of interpretive materials within, it seeks to make more transparent the principle of fostering unity without imposing uniformity. Our worship hymnal is not just a book of hymns; it is also a great educational tool. In our Sunday School and LOGOS classes we use it to teach the Sunday calendar, principle and lesser festivals, and commemorations. And, there are suggested Bible verses and hymns attributed for each of these occasions. It is important that we stay current with these tools for worship and continuing education. Now, these books aren't cheap, but in keeping with the fresh new start of our congregation, we thought that each member, or family, could purchase one or more of the books. The cost per book depends upon the quantity purchased, but we estimate the price at \$23.00. And, commemorative bookplates would be available should you wish to honor a loved one or just as a reflection of your commitment to the Lutheran Church of Mahomet's mission station. We have 18 copies of *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* available, and will have them on a rack in the narthex for you to peruse while you consider our proposal.
